Course Title: Creative Writing

Course Number: 2201471

Course Objectives:

1. to provide students with opportunities for creative exploration in writing.
2. to explore creative techniques for discovering and developing ideas for writing
3. to use the creative process in writing: creating ideas, developing ideas, discovering or selecting forms, revising, editing, and formatting the writing.
4. to learn how to respond with productive criticism to another's writing.
5. to learn how to receive and use productive criticism to revise writing
6. to learn to explore and use the forms of personal essay, poetry and short stories
7. to discover one's own writer's voice in various forms of writing.
8. to learn and apply the rules of editing and formatting.

Learning Outcomes:

A. Knowledge and understanding

1) Intellectual Skills (cognitive and analytical)

- a) Knowledge of the forms of personal and literary essay, poetry, and short story.
- b) Knowledge of the paradigm of the creative process
- c) Ability to analyze a piece of writing, one's own or another's, for revising and editing suggestions.
- d) Ability to revise with the purpose of the piece and the reader's needs in mind.

2) Subject-specific skills

- a) skill in developing ideas, using creative techniques
- b) skill in organizing writing according to the purpose and audience for the writing
- c) skill in revising and editing written drafts
- d) skill in formatting finished work, seeing formatting as a theoretical element of the finished piece.

3) Transferable Skills

All of the subject-specific skills mentioned above can transfer to writing in other academic subjects or in the professional world.

Teaching Methods:

- 1) **Lectures** : an average of 15 minutes per class will consist of informative lectures
- 2) **Workshops**: most classes will contain some workshop time spent in writing, readings, responding to writing, revising or editing.
- 3) **Assignments and projects**: students' assignments consist of daily writing in response to prompts assigned or chosen, assigned types of writing and mid-term and final writing projects.

Scope Time-permitting, the following genres will be discussed over the course of the semester: poetry, short fiction, and plays.

Class Format Class will generally begin with a 10-minute informative lecture. The rest of the class time will be divided between literary analysis and workshop. In preparation for literary analysis, students should come with textual criticism to share with the class. Unpreparedness will affect the 'participation' grading component. For workshop, assignments should be completed. Students should be prepared to read their work aloud to the class and to give their peers constructive criticism in turn.
